

Then Bullet Journaling could be for you!

Bullet Journaling is a creative, notebook-based method of personal organisation. There is a formal 'system' but it's very simple, and the great thing about bullet journaling is that once you've got the basics, you can develop it in whatever way works for you – it can be as methodical or as creative as you want it to be! Please bring a notebook and pens (preferably coloured!) with you to get started.



# Financial Planning during your ministry and beyond

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The aim of this seminar is to help clergy (and their partners) at all stages of their ministry, demystify financial matters, and to help you plan for your financial future no matter how far you may be from retirement.

This useful seminar will be led by independent financial advisers from Ecclesiastical Financial Advisory Services and we will also be hearing from subject experts from The Church of England Pensions Board, clergy pension and housing teams.

The speakers will address personal financial planning issues and questions that in their experience face most clergy during their ministry and will encourage you to think ahead about planning for your financial futures.

Key themes for the day:

- General financial planning hints and tips including budgeting
- The importance of planning ahead and saving for the future
- What to expect from the clergy pension scheme and possible options for saving more and options for any non-church pension schemes you might have?
- Saving & investing hints and tips including tax efficiency, investment risks, and ethical investment options
- The impact of living in employer provided accommodation on buying property (or remortgaging) during your ministry
- Retirement housing support available from the church
- Protecting your family and income
- Answering your financial questions (questions are encouraged!)



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### Mental Health First Aid

Cost: £30 (to cover the manual and other materials).

Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) teaches people how to identify, understand and help someone who may be experiencing a mental health issue.

MHFA won't teach you to be a therapist, but it will teach you to listen, reassure and respond, even in a crisis – and even potentially stop a crisis from happening. On completing the course, you will receive a nationally recognised qualification as a Mental Health First Aider.

#### On the course you will:

- Learn how to recognise warning signs of mental ill health, and develop the skills and confidence to approach and support someone while keeping yourself safe.
- Learn how to empower someone to access the support they might need for recovery or successful management of symptoms. This could include self-help books or websites, accessing therapy services through their GP, their school or place of work, online self-referral, support groups, and more.
- Gain an understanding of how to support positive wellbeing and tackle stigma.

You will need to pay for your own course manual which costs £30. Your parish may cover this for you. The diocese will provide the course to you free of charge (the usual cost is £300). If this cost is preventing you attending, please be in touch.



Gregg Okesson, A Public Missiology: How Local Churches Witness to a Complex World (Baker Academic, 2020)

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

This book explores how local congregations can 'thicken' their witness in the public spaces in which they live, work, and play.

Priya Parker, The Art of Gathering: How we Meet and Why it Matters (Penguin, 2019).

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We spend our lives gathering - first in classrooms and then in meetings, weddings, conferences and away days. We've all sat in meetings where people talk past each other or go through the motions and others which galvanise a team and remind everyone why they first took the job. We've been to weddings that were deeply moving and others that were run-of-the-mill and simply faded away. In The Art of Gathering, through analysis of all sorts of meetings imaginable, Priya Parker gets to the heart how to design a truly transformative gathering. An expert on organizing successful gatherings whether in conference centres, crisis zones or her living room, Parker shows us how to create moving, magical, mind-changing experiences - even in spaces where we've come to expect little.
